SURREY ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY ANNUAL REPORT 2007-2008

This is the 153rd Annual Report of the Surrey Archaeological Society and the 34th Annual Report of the Board of Directors of the Incorporated Surrey Archaeological Society. The report and accounts are for the period 1st April 2007 to 31st March 2008.

GENERAL

The Annual General Meeting was held on 25th November 2007 in the Guildhall, Guildford. Mr K D Graham was re-elected as President for a second year. The Honorary Vice-Presidents and Vice-Presidents were re-elected and Mr J Cotton and Mr P Youngs were elected as Vice-Presidents in recognition of their work for the Society. The Honorary Officers were re-elected with the addition of Mrs R Hughesdon as Honorary Librarian and Mr J Pile as Joint Honorary Editor. Mr P Youngs stood down as Honorary Secretary and was replaced by Mr D Calow. Mr Youngs was warmly thanked for his work.

The following members of the Society were elected to serve as ordinary Members of Council to retire in 2011: Mr J Boult, Mrs N Cowlard, Mr A Hall, Mrs P Hulse, Mr C Taylor. The retiring members of Council, Mrs M Broomfield, Mrs G Rapson and Mr C Walker were thanked for their work on behalf of the Society.

M G Beattie & Co Ltd were appointed as Auditors and Council was authorised to determine their remuneration.

A Special General Meeting set to zero joining charges for new members of the Society.

Mrs M Williams kindly arranged a very interesting walk around the centre of Guildford before the meeting. Mrs M Alexander completed the theme with an excellent talk after the AGM about the medieval buildings in the town.

Activities

The Council approved a Risk Analysis and Five Year Rolling Strategy in 2007. This identified three concerns: accommodation, the administrative structure of the Society and declining membership.

The future of the Society's accommodation in Guildford Museum has not yet been fully resolved. In 2003 Guildford Borough Council issued a Notice to terminate the Agreement governing the Society's occupation of its accommodation. The Society is entitled to a new lease for the existing accommodation and Guildford Borough Council officers have confirmed their intention to complete negotiations with the Society for a new lease on acceptable terms. The Society continues to rent storage at Cranleigh and Bletchingley. The latter provides space for publications and for the Artefacts and Archives Research Group and room for occasional meetings. The Society is very grateful to Mrs S Goad for making this possible.

A Review Group, chaired by Mr A Bott, met during the year to consider the administrative structure of the Society and made a number of recommendations to be discussed by Council.

There have been several initiatives to support membership including the Society's new interactive website designed by Mr A Larcombe for which Mr T Wilcock will be the webmaster. This will allow members to join a discussion forum and give the Committees and Groups the facility to post and maintain their own pages. Colour has been introduced to the *Bulletin* making a good publication even better and the key conferences have welcomed high profile speakers. The prestige lecture by Professor E Fernie at the Yehudi Menuhin Hall in June and the Annual Lecture series set high standards. The Society was delighted that Professor B Cunliffe gave the keynote presentation at the important Surrey Archaeological Research Framework conference in October. The Symposium in February was considered by many to be the best yet, providing

a professional showcase for the research activities of the Society's members through presentations and displays. The Margary Award was won by Leatherhead and District Local History Society.

The Society has increased its archaeological activity. The community archaeology excavations at Hatch Furlong, Ewell, have been successful and show the results of partnership between Birkbeck College, Epsom and Ewell Historical and Archaeological Society, Surrey Archaeological Society and others. The careful excavation of Ashtead Roman Villa by Dr D Bird and the Roman Studies Group is encouraging as was the rapid response team that Mr P Harp organised to excavate at Wayneflete's Tower, Esher. Other experienced groups have worked on surveys at Newark Priory, Holmbury Hillfort and the Bee Garden, Chobham. These projects will be helped by new equipment such as the Society's new magnetometer.

The Council decided membership fees would not be increased this year.

External bodies

The Society has many links with other local and regional bodies. Meetings with different parts of Surrey County Council, for example, help us maintain close relationships with Surrey History Centre. The Society has also taken part in the Council's Culture Forum and various consultations. We are pleased that another survey of land in an Area of Special Historic and Landscape Value has been agreed, this time at Chilworth. A new showroom at Guildford Museum houses a modern display of Prehistoric and Roman finds from the county and Mrs M Alexander organised an excellent exhibition on religion in the Roman period. The new regional branch of CBA London was established and the Society is represented on the Board. The early emphasis is on creating good links with decision makers and archaeological societies in London.

Administration

The ever helpful support of the staff at Castle Arch is one of the strengths of the Society. Mrs S Janaway and Mrs M Roberts were joined by Mrs H Jeffery who took over as Assistant Librarian from Mrs S Ashcroft. Mrs Ashcroft deserves particular thanks for working without an Honorary Librarian for most of the year. Although each has their own responsibilities they support each other and their teamwork and the help of the volunteers who assist is greatly appreciated.

The Honorary Officers are thanked for the time and effort they devote to the Society, in particular the Editors of the *Collections* and the *Bulletin*. These professional publications are of great importance and the Society is fortunate that they are produced to a high standard. The Society also thanks the many members who make considerable contributions of time and experience to ensure the Society maintains its professional and friendly approach to its work. Their personal efforts are of great importance to the Society whether arranging displays, working in committees, on visits or excavations, representing the Society or taking part in any of the other activities of the Society.

Membership

On 31st March 2008, the membership was as follows (31st March 2007 figures in brackets); 9(10) honorary; 6(6) life; 623(646) ordinary; 70(72) associate; 20(18) junior; 11(8) student and 142(145) institutional; total 881(905).

It is with great sadness that the death of the following members is recorded: Mrs J F Banks, Mrs D M Fedoruk, Mr F A Hastings, Mr R J Milward, Mr W F Nixon, Mr D M Sturley, Miss J Tyrell and Mr P J Wooden.

Local Secretaries

Mr C Taylor has continued his energetic work with the Local Secretaries producing informative newsletters and arranging two useful meetings, one on the Surrey County Council website 'Exploring Surrey's Past' and one on the History Centre.

FINANCE

The Society's Accounts for the year to 31st March 2008 are set out in the final section of this report and again disclose a substantial overall operating surplus on the activities of the year after taking account of interest received. This surplus was however subject to a charge in respect of realised losses incurred on investment changes effected during the year. As a result of the general decline in the value of the investments during the year up to the 31st March 2008, the Society sustained an unrealised depreciation in the value of its portfolio investments which has resulted in a substantial reduction in capital over the year. It remains the Council's policy to preserve the capital fund in the long term interests of the Society as the income generated is still required to sustain core activities.

There was a fall in subscription income resulting from the reduction in membership but this was supplemented by gift aid recoveries in the year. Receipts from publications were in line with the budget in a year when no supplementary items were available for sale. All the Society's groups achieved a surplus on their activities as did most of the annual events held in the year.

Income from portfolio investments were much as predicted and income from interest increased substantially as a result of higher interest rates and surplus funds available to invest.

In most cases administration expenditure was contained within budgeted figures, with increases in line with inflation on salaries and similar costs. Publication expenditure includes the *Collections, Bulletin* and the cost of *Surrey History* consequent upon our arrangements with the previous Surrey Local History Council. The investment fees incurred are in respect of amounts charged directly by HSBC Management in dealing with the Society's portfolio.

The Society continues to recognise the invaluable voluntary contributions made by members and others towards the true costs of running of the Society. The Society is extremely grateful for the consideration given to the Society in so far as services are supplied either in an honorary capacity or at extremely competitive rates by our professional advisers.

Finance Committee Report

The Finance Committee met twice during the year as has become customary. On the 21st June 2007, the committee considered the draft accounts for the year ended 31st March 2007. These were subsequently approved by Council and presented to the Annual General Meeting. In January 2008, a draft budget for 2008-9 was approved by the Committee and Council.

The Finance Subcommittee met five times during the year. Their primary concern was to review the performance of the Society's investments which, following the resignation of Helmore & Helmore Ltd., were now managed by HSBC and the Charities Aid Fund. In view of the unresolved accommodation issue and uncertainty in the financial markets, it was decided to retain the funds deposited in CAF accounts in the Birmingham and Midshires Building Society. As a result of dissatisfaction with the performance of certain funds managed by HSBC, the Committee met with HSBC and requested they submit proposals to meet the concerns expressed. HSBC proposals to switch these funds were subsequently accepted by the committee.

The Committee also reviewed the membership subscription which had last been increased in 2002. The Committee noted that in the intervening period costs had risen disproportionately with the result that the proportion of subscription income had fallen from one-third of the Society's operating expenditure to one-quarter; in addition the Society's accommodation costs were likely to rise in 2008. However, in view of the Society's desire to increase membership and the increased income derived from the Society's changed investment policy, the Committee recommended to Council that subscriptions should remain unchanged for the time being. The Committee also recommended that the entrance fee of £1 on joining the Society, as provided for in the Articles and Memorandum of Association, should be reduced to nil. These recommendations were approved by Council.

Although the Committee had hoped to be able to recommend that the accounts for the year

under review would be subject to examination, rather than audit as hitherto, conflict between requirements under Company law and Charity rules applicable to the Society remained, and accounts for the year 2007-8 will therefore subject to full audit.

Following a recommendation of the Committee, Council agreed that non-specific bequests under £5,000 should be added to the Sesquicentennial Fund for the library automatically. Those over £5,000 should be considered on a case by case basis unless otherwise designated by the benefactor.

The Committee undertook a review of the Risk Assessment and Rolling Strategy.

INVESTMENT REPORT

Following the rearrangement outlined in the previous report, the Society's investment portfolio was managed throughout the year under review by HSBC Investments in funds in the name of their nominees. Adjustments to the portfolio were effected during the year to reposition the funds within the agreed benchmark which remained throughout as 55% in UK equities, 25% in fixed interest stocks, 15% in property and 5% in cash.

The value of the portfolio investments declined substantially during the year in line with the general market trends which resulted in an overall loss in respect of both realised and unrealised losses of approximately £165,000. The total investment held in CAF accounts at 31st March 2008 was £439,000.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES OF THE SOCIETY

Archaeological Research Committee

The committee has continued to act as the primary forum for discussion of current research within the historic county, and as a liaison group has a selection of members from both professional and amateur bodies, including the groups of the Society and other voluntary organisations involved in local history or archaeology research. It has encouraged research in the last year through a series of grants, and through the annual Archaeological Research Symposium which was regarded as being the best within recent memory. A notable expenditure has been the purchase of a laptop computer available for use with the Society's other equipment for survey work and digital presentations. The committee has been heavily involved in the Surrey Archaeological Research Framework. The Honorary Secretary Mrs P Hulse and Mrs A Gaitonde deserve particular thanks for their work in organising the Symposium and Mr G Stonehouse should be thanked for the care he takes of the archaeological tools and equipment.

Community Archaeology

During the course of the year an historic landscape survey was commenced at Chilworth led by Mr P Masters. This was designed to look at the countryside around the well-known gunpowder works and in particular at the water management system in the valley bottom. It was also decided to commission a training dig and work has been started on the preliminary arrangements, though the actual dig is due to take place in August 2008 at Cobham on the site of an 18th century mill.

Events Committee

The Committee met on three occasions in 2007-8. Three major events dominated the year.

First, the Annual Lecture Series was held in Ewell on the theme of 'Experimental Archaeology'. Five excellent lecturers gave an insight into the approach to knowledge by reconstructing the past. The lectures covered the manufacture of medieval gunpowder, food preparation in the Tudor kitchens at Hampton Court, the Butser Experiment and reproducing medieval structures in wood. The final lecture was on Battle Re-enactment at the Wychurst Late Saxon Manorial Estate Project with great emphasis on the safe use of lethal weapons. All the lectures were excellent; it was disappointing that the average attendance was less than 30.

The second event was a different type of experiment. Following the success of the lectures in the anniversary year it was decided to arrange a prestige lecture in the early summer. It was with great pleasure that the Yehudi Menuhin School was able to offer their superb concert hall for such an event. A distinguished Vice-President of the Society, Professor Eric Fernie, talked on aspects of the Normans in England. Almost 100 members and friends attended a very successful evening and it was subsequently agreed to hold a similar event in 2008. We were delighted when Dr Simon Thurley, Chief Executive of English Heritage, accepted an invitation to talk in June 2008.

The third event was the continuation conference of the Surrey Archaeological Research Framework at Leatherhead in October, which was organised by the Roman Studies Group and is reported elsewhere. This Committee was not directly responsible for the event but provided logistic and technical backup.

Grants and Special Projects Committee

The Committee was not required to meet during the year and no grants were made.

Historic Buildings Committee

The committee met three times in the year, primarily discussing known cases of buildings at risk to loss or inappropriate change, and to consider arranging visits and talks for the Society's programme.

A guided tour of the more important historic buildings in Godalming was run in the autumn and from the success of this it was agreed that further visits and perhaps talks should be organised each year. Those planned for the next six months include a visit to the Brooking Collection (at Cranleigh) and the historic research and wind-tunnel buildings at Farnborough.

The potential to assist with research and recording work in respect of certain masonry structures has been discussed, albeit that this may be more appropriate for individuals to contribute to rather than the committee as a group. However, a grant of £250 was awarded to the Friends of Woking Palace towards the cost of photographic recording. Work has begun on creating case records relating to buildings at risk or of interest to be lodged with the Society's library and be available to researchers.

Consideration is being given to producing a book illustrating a balanced selection of buildings and structures of widely varying forms and uses. However, it has been recognised that this would be a long-term project for which a suitable editor needs to be recruited to coordinate submissions.

Library Committee

This has been a year of change in the library. The committee welcomed Mrs R Hughesdon who took on the role of Honorary Librarian in July and was elected to office at the AGM. Mrs S Ashcroft retired in September after nearly 13 years as Assistant Librarian, but very kindly worked on until the end of 2007. It was a mark of the esteem in which she was held that her leaving party was packed with those who wanted to wish her well. She is succeeded by Mrs H Jeffery, who is rapidly familiarising herself with the library's systems and collections.

Fortunately continuity is provided by Mr D Turner, who has kindly agreed to remain Chairman of the Library Committee on a permanent basis, by Mrs S Janaway and Mrs M Roberts who continue to provide invaluable assistance and by the volunteers, without whom the library could not function as it does. The committee was pleased to welcome Mr J Janaway to the ranks of volunteers – he joins Mrs M Williams, Mrs P Panman, Ms J English, Miss A Bowey, Mr G Brown and Dr and Mrs Christophers to whom a considerable debt of gratitude is owed for their continuing hard work. The work done by Dr R Christophers and Mr J Janaway in cataloguing the existing research material is now complete and work by Mrs Christophers has seen an increasing number of older books and pamphlets added to the computer catalogue. The availability of the catalogue on the internet is resulting in an increasing number of enquiries from people who are not members of the Society. Some of these, on visiting the library, have expressed an interest in joining the Society.

Thanks to the work of Mr R Williams and Miss A Bowey, the library once again opened its doors for Heritage Open Day. Displays were also taken to the Local History Symposium (thanks to Mr R Williams for the selection of material) and to the Archaeological Research Symposium.

Publications and Editorial Committee

Volume 93 of the *Collections* on the Farley Heath and Wanborough temples was published this year. Also seven issues of the *Bulletin* were published. Publication of *Surrey History* was

delayed but volume VII number 4 appeared in the spring. Volume 94 of the *Collections* will be published in 2008. The Village Studies report on Gomshall, Peaslake and Ewhurst is nearly ready for publication and volumes on Old Woking, Cobham and Cranleigh are also making progress. A volume on the Surrey dendrochronology project by Mr R Wild is in preparation.

The Committee met four times during the year. It was decided in principle to digitize the *Collections* and to make them available from the web. Questions of copyright of the articles and especially the illustrations still need to be resolved. Over the last year the Society sold 37 copies of *Surrey History*, 8 copies of *Aspects of Archaeology & History in Surrey* and 70 copies of *Hidden Depths*.

The Editors are thanked for their hard work in maintaining the high standard of the Society's publications.

South Park Moat Committee

During the course of the year the owner, Mrs Fedoruk, became seriously ill and the property was put on the open market. Sadly, Mrs Fedoruk subsequently died and the situation over the Society's lease and the future ownership of the moat is uncertain. Consequently basic maintenance work has continued but no further capital expenditure will be undertaken until the situation becomes clearer. The bridge, which is in a poor state of repair, remains closed but otherwise the site is in good condition.

Surrey Industrial History Group

The year started with the South East Region Industrial Archaeology Conference at the University of Reading. The Secretary of the Group, Mr A Thomas, spoke on 'The Epsom Mental Institutions'.

On 3rd May a visit was made to Swallow's Tiles near Cranleigh. Swallow's Tiles was established some 140 years ago to manufacture facing bricks and drainage pipes but more recently concentrated on handmade roof tiles. Unfortunately, the factory has since closed but the Group managed to record much of what went on. A visit took place on 28th July, this time to the Wandle Industrial Museum, led by Mr R Turier.

At the AGM Mrs G Crocker and Mr T Gregory were re-elected. Immediately following the AGM the 2007 Conservation Award was presented to the Horsley Countryside Preservation Society for restoration work on the Lovelace Bridges. The presentation was followed by a talk on the project and a visit to Stony Dene Bridge. This was the 25th plaque to be awarded and a booklet recording the history of the first 25 awards has been prepared.

The September issue of the *Newsletter* was edited by Mr J Spencer because of difficulties Mr D Evans was having with his sight. Mr Spencer has now taken over as Newsletter editor and has added a splash of colour to the front and back pages. Our thanks go to Mr Evans who edited some 107 editions of the *Newsletter* and we hope that following his eye operation his sight will improve; he has expressed his willingness to continue as Membership Secretary.

Following on from a talk in September 2007, 13 of our group made a successful visit to Sheffield to explore the remains of the iron and steel industry. We visited two industrial hamlets dating back to the 17th century as well as the Kelham Island district of the city, which is one of the city's oldest industrial districts and now home to an industrial museum. At the end of the trip some of us visited the very modern Outokumpu Stainless Melting and Continuous Casting plant. Our particular thanks go to Mr T Gregory and his wife for organising the visit.

The 32nd Series of Industrial Archaeology Lectures commenced on 25th September 2007 with a talk by Dr M Bailey on 'The Life and Works of Thomas Telford'. The last in the lecture series was a talk by Mr M Harverson on 'Mills of the Muslim World'. 47 people signed up for the lecture series and on average there were about 15 visitors at each talk.

Membership of the group currently stands at 123; 98 ordinary, 12 associate, 9 institutional and

4 life members. My thanks go to members of the group and committee members who have supported the work of the group throughout the year.

Surrey Local History Committee

During the year, the Committee organised three events. The Summer Meeting, in July, was based at Haslemere Museum and was very well-attended. It involved a talk on 'Haslemere Museum' by Mr R Muir followed by a tour of the displays and library, lunch provided by the Friends, a talk by Mr H Turrell-Clarke on 'Haslemere Buildings' and a guided tour of the town. We are greatly indebted to Mr Muir and his colleagues for an excellent day. The Local History Symposium held in Cherstey in October was on the theme of 'Surrey Bridges and Tunnels'. There were 6 excellent speakers: Mr P Cross-Rudkin on 'The Bridges of Surrey', Mr P Sowan on 'Tunnelling through Surrey: a worm's eye view of the county', Dr D Renn on 'Medieval Bridges in Surrey'. Mrs B Lewis on 'Bridges and Tunnels as landscape features in Surrey Gardens'. Mr A Norris on The Lovelace Bridges at East Horsley' and Mr J Smith on Weybridge Railway Bridge: a hard-won bargain'. As usual there was a large number of displays by local history societies from all over the county. The Gravett Award was presented by Dr G Moss to the Horsley Countryside Preservation Society for their display on the Loyelace Bridges. A Spring Meeting on 'Social Insurance: Friendly, Benevolent and Savings Societies' was to be held at Godstone in March but unfortunately had to be cancelled because of difficulties in finding appropriate speakers.

Publication of volume 7, part 4, of *Surrey History*, edited by Mr A Cornwall and Mrs G Crocker, was unfortunately delayed but was eventually distributed to members in May 2008. The articles, which are of a high standard, are on an air disaster on Hankley Common, brewing in Surrey, Surrey tokens of the 19th and 20th centuries, water supply in Surrey and Surrey History Centre accessions of records in 2006.

At the beginning of the year we welcomed Mr J Pooley of the Surrey History Centre to the Committee. However during the year Mr Cornwall resigned as Editor of *Surrey History* and also from the Committee. Also at the end of the year, Professor A Crocker reported that he intended to stand down as Chairman at the end of 2008 and Mrs Crocker stated that she was willing to edit the 2008 issue of *Surrey History*, which would complete volume 7, but was not prepared to edit any further issues. In June 2008 replacements have not been found so that the future of the Committee and its contributions to the Society are in doubt. Nevertheless, a programme of meetings has been planned up to and including Spring 2010.

REPORTS FROM GROUPS OF THE SOCIETY

Artefacts and Archives Research Group

The group is continuing to use the Rover's Den, Ockham Parish Room for its meetings. The Parish Council has allowed the group to have a second storage cupboard which is a great asset.

Following submission of the project design for Stage III of Weston Wood, English Heritage requested that an Access database be compiled of the content of the context records surviving from the site. The work is being carried out by Mrs M Broomfield and Mrs I Ellis.

Work on processing and recording the building material from the excavations in 2006 and 2007 at Ashtead Roman Villa is continuing. The flue tile patterns are being recorded, analysed and compared with known examples from the site. Fabric analysis will commence shortly. Mr A Hall and Mrs M Broomfield are continuing to photograph the artefacts from the site held at Guildford Museum and will also be recording relevant finds lodged with Leatherhead Museum. Items from the site held in the British Museum store have been photographed; those on display at the museum are still to be worked on.

Mrs J Hicks is continuing with work on Newark Priory. Mrs I Ellis and Ms J English continue to work on the Bee Garden, Chobham Common and Mrs P Hulse and Mrs R Hooker are cataloguing the artefacts from Holmbury, Anstiebury and Hascombe hillforts.

Guildford Archaeology & Local History Group

A successful programme of meetings for 2006/2007 ended in July 2007 with the annual informal garden party, hosted by Mr and Mrs Anderson. The programme for 2007/2008 included public lectures held on alternate months at Guildford United Reformed Church, with Members' meetings in the intervening months held at Guildford Museum, courtesy of Guildford Borough Council. The public meetings put the history of Guildford into the context of recent archaeological and historical research further afield in the County including fieldwork at Holmbury hillfort, the excavations at the Roman site at Ashtead, and recent research into the history of Old Woking; other topics have included a general overview of recent archaeological investigations in southwest Surrey, and the work of the Artefacts and Archives Research Group. The Members' meetings have heard about developments at Butser Ancient Farm, and the Roman Studies Group's recent work on Roman roads. The Group has, at its meetings, also revisited (though not physically) small-scale excavations undertaken in Guildford in the 1970s by its then members, material from which has been stored privately. As a result, some members have been meeting separately to sort and identify the material so that the 1970s excavations may be published.

A programme of meetings for 2008/2009 is being prepared and the Group is anxious to attract new members to enable it to undertake practical research into Guildford's rich history.

Medieval Studies Forum

The Medieval Studies Forum was launched at a meeting in Leatherhead in June 2007, with further meetings held in October and March. Topics featured included the excavations at Bermondsey Abbey, the development of village morphologies, aspects of Surrey's medieval waterways and of Surrey's medieval churches, Borderware pottery and the development of Bagshot. By the end of the year 51 members of the Society had joined the Forum. The Committee consists of Mrs M Alexander, Mr P Balmer, Mrs P Savage, Mr R Savage and Mr P Stevens.

Plateau Group

Plateau has continued to hold evening meetings twice a month, with additional monthly evening visits and day-trips to sites of historical or archaeological interest. Weekend excavation at Tattenham Way allotments, Banstead finished in late summer 2007, with progress being hampered with near continuous groundwater in the trench. At the AGM, Mr C Bagnall was re-elected Chairman, Mr P Harp Secretary and Ms S Hill Treasurer.

Prehistoric Group

Members of the group continue to pursue a number of projects, some in cooperation with other groups of the Society. The Holmbury hillfort analytical survey has been completed and a report is in preparation; also a damage assessment of the site has taken place and a report of this has been deposited with the Society. New projects are now under discussion. In 2007 the AGM lecture by Mr D McOmish of English Heritage was well attended and has set a standard for the future.

Roman Studies Group

The Group had another successful year. There was as usual a series of monthly talks throughout the winter, which were very well attended, and the Group had a key part in arranging the Roman-themed section of the October SARF conference, including a keynote talk from Professor B Cunliffe. A proposed seminar on water in Roman Britain attracted such good speakers that it developed into a full conference to be chaired by Professor M Fulford. Particular thanks are due to Mr E Walker for the arrangements and publicity, and to Mrs R Hunter and Mrs S Fagg for management of location and audiovisual support both for the conference and for the winter talks.

The settlement sub-group, led by Mr F Pemberton, has nearly completed a report on the Purberry Shot site in Ewell and attention has turned to post-excavation work on the Church Field excavations. Once again, members assisted with the Hatch Furlong project. The roads

sub-group (Mr A Hall) concentrated mainly on the London-Winchester road with fieldwork led by Mr D Calow that provided good results in Hampshire but less certain ones at Flexford and near Tongham. The Iron Age sub-group (Mr E Walker) has checked sites at Puttenham and Wisley but is awaiting completion of a database as the key to constructing a work programme. Mrs N Cowlard is leading a rural settlement sub-group that has developed out of one looking at villas; again a database will be key but work in the Ewell area and centred on the Abinger villa is in progress. Field walking and magnetometer survey near the latter are part of a project aimed at completion of post-excavation work and understanding of the wider context of the villa. The databases mentioned above are the work of Mr Hall, and are nearly complete.

A second season of fieldwork was carried out at the Ashtead Common villa. The site had been cleared by the Estate rangers who also helped in many other ways, including with the supply of a compound and provision of further magnetometer and topographical surveys. Two trenches were opened, one of which established comparative dating for part of the villa plan (room 11 pre-dates rooms 10, 12 and 13) and the other examined the front corridor and debris from the robbing of the villa. This second trench has still to be completed but has produced many useful stratified finds, including wall plaster. Good progress has been maintained with work on all of the finds from the site (led by Mrs M Broomfield), and current work on the ceramic building material has been aided by talks from Dr P Warry and Dr I Betts. A full photographic record has been made by Mr Hall and Mrs Broomfield of finds at the British Museum. The search continues for some of the special finds from Mr A W G Lowther's excavations.

Visits to the Barcombe Roman villa excavations and to Fishbourne were arranged by Mrs Cowlard. Mr C van der Lande has taken on the mantle of arranger of visits. Group membership has held up well and new members are being recruited. The Group relies greatly on the enthusiasm and efficiency of its Chairman, Dr D Bird, and Secretary, Mr Hall.

Villages Study Group

The Group met twice during the year. Work is well advanced on the drafting and editing of the combined report on Gomshall, Peaslake & Ewhurst, with a view to publication late in 2008 or early in 2009. Work is also progressing on the drafting of the report on Old Woking, with a view to publication in 2009/10. Mr R and Mrs P Savage took over as convenors of the Villages Study Group at the beginning of the year. Following consultation with the members, meetings focussed on developing skills to progress the studies in the future will be held in 2008/9.

Investment Strategy

The investment strategy will continue to be subject to constant review with our investment managers.

Reserves Policy

The Society is almost totally dependent on its own income from subscriptions, investments, deposits etc. to fund its core activities to which are added limited external grants when available. Its capital funds therefore need to be maintained and its expenditure year on year geared to available sources of income.

Risk Assessment

The Society's Council has adopted a risk assessment policy which seeks to identify the major risks to which the Society may be subject and which might affect the Society's ability to adequately achieve its objectives. Policies, procedures and systems to mitigate identified risks so far as is practical are in place to cover both business and financial risks, in particular to maintain membership, to ensure the continuance of research including excavation and publication and to monitor the activities of members engaged in pursuance of the Society's activities.

Statement of Directors'/Trustees' Responsibilities

NOTE 1

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of listed investments which are incorporated at market value each year.
- b) Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement (Financial Reporting Statement Number 1) on the grounds that the company qualifies as a small company.

- d) No depreciation is charged in respect of the Society's research material, maps and prints. Other tangible assets have been depreciated at rates calculated to write them off over their useful lives as follows:

- e) These accounts do not recognise any value in respect of publications held for resale. Proceeds thereon are taken to credit as received.
- f) No provision for taxation arises on any surplus realised due to the Society's charitable status. Gift Aid is recognised as received.
