It embraces anthropology, cultural history, cultural geography and military history. Renowned military historian Andrew Robertshaw brings together a panel of leading international archaeologists to examine diverse projects in the field.

- **Simon Jones** - World War One: The recovery and identification of the remains of two British soldiers killed at La Boisselle, France, in 1915
- **Olga Ivshina** - The Russian Front in World War Two: The immense task of recovering and identifying the remains of soldiers in Western Russia and the challenges of channelling volunteers in a poorly-funded arena
- **Richard Osgood** - A Bronze Age Massacre: An archaeological project on Salisbury Plain
- **Andrew Robertshaw** - World Wars: The ethics of recovering human remains from world war battlefields which have become sites of cultural heritage
