Visit to Winchester

As an innovation, we decided this year that the summer meeting would take the form of a visit to a place of medieval interest (and there are few places in England with more of medieval interest than Winchester). Thus on 23 June a modest group of us had a packed day, so packed that lunch had to be rather hurried, with guided tours of the cathedral and St Cross Hospital as well as first-rate lectures by Dr Ryan Lavelle and Graham Scobie on aspects of medieval Winchester's history and archaeology. Forthcoming meetings

Saturday 24 November 2012

Members will already have received the notice of the meeting on "The Medieval Mind" (and seen the item in *Bulletin* 435). The meeting will take place at East Horsley Village Hall, with tea and coffee from 10.30.

There will be two external speakers. Professor John Henderson of Birkbeck College will speak on aspects of Understanding Plague in Late Medieval Italy and Dr Sophie Page of University College, London, will speak on Magic and religion in the Late Middle Ages. In addition, we have three speakers from among our members: Rob Briggs on Compton Church, Brian Creese on medieval sex and marriage, and Peter Balmer on the three fourteenth century bishops of Winchester who were also Chancellors of England.

Saturday 16th March 2013

The first meeting of next year will be devoted to the pre-Conquest period, and will be on 16 March at the Surrey History Centre in Woking. Dr Stuart Brookes (UCL) has agreed to give the keynote presentation (topic to be announced), and Nathalie Cohen will talk on "Finds from the foreshore: Anglo-Saxon and medieval evidence recorded during inter-tidal survey".

We are, however, lacking contributions from our own members and would welcome talks, which need not be long, on any topic related to the pre-Conquest period. If you would like to give a presentation please contact Brian Creese.

Saturday 11th May 2013

A day conference will be held at the Surrey History Centre, Woking, on both documentary and archaeological evidence from Surrey and Hampshire regarding "Medieval pottery and the transition to post-medieval production". The list of expert speakers is extensive with Jacqui Pearce, Peter Tipton, Ben Jervis, Clive Orton, Phil Jones, Steve Nelson, David Barker and Graham Dawson all in the programme. Details and application form will be circulated shortly. Numbers attending will be limited to 75.

Early plans are being made for a visit in June to Bermondsey, an area that many forget belongs to the historic county of Surrey.

Abbeys and priories

A question that has been raised by members is that of what distinguished an abbey from a priory in the Middle Ages. This apparently simple question does not have a very simple answer as the monastic orders had varying practices, so a note is attached at the end of this newsletter as **Annex 1**.

This in turn begs a further question about the nature of these various orders, a question to which the answer could occupy several books. Instead, another brief note is attached, in this case in tabular form. (**Annex 2**).

Review of recent conference at the British Museum on the Portable Antiquities Scheme

In October, Rob Briggs attended what sounds like a very interesting conference at the British Museum on "Objects and Landscape: understanding the medieval period through finds recorded by the Portable Antiquities Scheme" and has sent us a review.
