

LiDAR groundtruthing

The <u>Surrey LiDAR Portal</u> is an online interactive citizen science map which includes various LiDAR datasets for all of Surrey, including the historic county, as well as historic maps and HER data to help in analysing the imagery.

LiDAR has enormous potential to uncover previously unknown archaeological features, and by helping map and interpret these sites online, volunteers can work to build a more complete story of the local landscape. Anyone is welcome to register for a free account, which will allow access to the interactive map. Volunteers who would like to be involved and help in digitising features should read the available tutorials and are encouraged to attend online training sessions (please contact us if you are interested, as we can discuss arranging a bespoke session).

The first 'groundtruthing' sessions of the year will take place at Holmwood Common on **Monday 18** and **Tuesday 19 March**, approximately 10:00-13:00, with further work at Leith Hill and Frensham (pending identification of features on the Portal) to possibly take place in April. Pendell Court Villa geophysics

Following a recently completed magnetometry survey at the site of Pendell Court Roman villa, Bletchingley, where remains of a hypocaust were uncovered in the early 19th century, further geophysics is planned for March, which volunteers are welcome to take part in. This will involve an electrical resistance survey which will focus on potential features revealed in the paddocks. An electrical survey is currently scheduled for **Wednesday 20** and **Wednesday 27 March** (approx. 9:30-15:30). Disposal of the Dead in Iron Age, Roman and Early Saxon SE England

This conference, run by the Sussex School of Archaeology & History in association with the SyAS Roman Studies Group, is taking place (both in person and online) on **Saturday 23 March** at Kings Church, Brooks Road, Lewes, BN7 2BY.

Tickets are in-person (which includes teas and coffees): $\pounds 25$ full price, $\pounds 20$ student, SyAS members and USAS/SSAH subscribers; online: $\pounds 12$. There will also be poster displays by local archaeology groups and bookstalls. For more details and to book, see <u>Eventbrite</u>.

In addition to reviewing the evidence for burial practices during the Iron Age, Romano-British and early Saxon periods in South-East England (and beyond), the day will also consider the fate of the 'missing millions'. How were these people 'disposed of'? Why were there apparently so few formal burials (cremations and inhumations) in both the Iron Age generally, and in the Romano-British countryside?

Finds from the FLO

This copper alloy penny token (<u>SUR-7906A8</u>) was issued by Joseph Howard in 1671 for use in his fashionable London coffee house where you could get the new wonder drink of the late 17th century. The obverse even depicts a man holding a cup and dispensing coffee from a pot. It is in extraordinary condition, lost in the mud of the Thames near Southwark.
