Monumentality and Landscapes: linear earthworks in Britain

Albury Park fieldwork

The first stage of a new community archaeology project in Albury Park will take place in March, which includes geophysical survey (both magnetometry and resistivity). The focus will be on the area of the former road between Albury and Shere and the now abandoned settlement – the original village of Albury along the Tillingbourne – whose displacement half a mile to the west began in the late 18th century.

This past weekend saw a fascinating study day at Chertsey Museum which focused on various aspects of Chertsey Abbey, its estates and the impact it had on local communities. The day featured a number of excellent talks, including Rob Briggs on the early charters, Euan Roger on the abbey in the late medieval period, Mark Forrest on Chertsey tenancy estates post-Black Death, David Taylor on the Chertsey estate of Cobham and Prof Amanda Luyster's video exhibition tour, all of which helped identify useful lines of inquiry, especially in terms of documentary research and analysis.

the organisers from the Medieval Studies Forum and all of the day's fantastic speakers.


We hope to be able to provide recordings of some of the talks soon, but in the meantime, do enjoy some presentations provided by 'Chertsey tiles' on YouTube.



LGBT+ History Month





LiDAR groundtruthing

Interested in joining the Surrey LiDAR team? In addition to the general digitising work, which has currently recorded over 300 features of interest from the higher resolution (0.25 and 0.5m) coverage of the county on the Surrey LiDAR Portal, targeted work is being arranged for digitising and ground-truthing LiDAR features at three sites this spring: Chobham Common, Box Hill and Headley Heath.

Finds from the FLO

This little farthing token SUR-7B4C77 (c.1650-1674) for the Shipwright's Arms pub, Rotherhithe Wall, is a previously unrecorded type, found by mudlarking only this past month. Entirely unique, its obverse bears Shipwright's arms, 'SHIP: CARPENTERS AR', while on the reverse is 'W/I*T triad, AT R(E)[DRIF]F:WALE'.





This intriguing gilded medieval harness pendant (SUR-A1624D), also found just recently in Bletchingley, is an earlier form than the heraldic types more often found and dated to the later 12th century. The copper alloy plate has traces of a moulded and gilded design remaining, comprising a triangular frame with a zigzag and pellet border at the lower edge and small inverted triangular panel over the apex.
