Surrey World War Two Bomb Incident Map



An exciting new project to create an interactive map of WW2 bomb incidents in Surrey has been set-up by Surrey Heritage and volunteer Martin Stilwell, starting with a pilot in the Woking area. The first map has been set up on Exploring Surrey's Past. The volunteer work will be at different levels, from creating data to map the bomb incidents, to more detailed

Albury Park test pitting

This June, the Society will be undertaking an exciting new test pitting programme at Albury Park, the now abandoned medieval settlement whose displacement half a mile to the west to Weston (the present day Albury) began in the 18th century. This year's pits will be focused across the course of the former eastwest road which ran through to Shere, along which former cottage foundations can still be traced.



Confirmed dates for test pitting are Monday 12 to Thursday 15 June. Volunteers are needed for both finds and digging; no prior experience is needed. If interested in taking part, please contact Anne at <u>outreach@surreyarchaeology.org.uk</u>.



West Horsley Place geophysics

This month saw a very successful two day resistivity survey at West Horsley Place, where a fantastic group of volunteers learned all about geophysical survey and helped with a high resolution 0.5x0.5m survey of the lawn and gardens surrounding the house. The survey supplements nicely what we know from the excavations under Surrey County Archaeological Unit last September, which exposed features including former garden walls across the frontage of the house which are apparent on the 1735 estate map, a brick-built soakaway and foundations of what was likely a predecessor to the current building. The house's west wing, which has been dendro-dated to the early 15th century by the Domestic Building Research Group, originally protruded further south than its current layout. Its foundations also show up nicely in the recent survey, as do former garden paths and beds in the lawn west of the house.

The team of volunteers worked well in two groups, with the Society's second Frobisher taken out for the first time to allow two lawn surveys to take place at the same time. We look forward to getting back to West Horsley later in the summer when we carry out a magnetometry survey over the same area - in the meantime, many thanks to all those who took part!

Cocks Farm Abinger 2023 dig

The latest season of excavations in the field adjacent to Cocks Farm Roman villa will take place 17 June to 23 July 2023. The plan is to further explore magnetometry features in the field adjacent to the villa, adding to our knowledge of activity from prehistory onwards.

Finds from the FLO

This themed #FindsFriday post highlights a bit of royal memorabilia recorded with the PAS, a copper alloy medallion commemorating the coronation of George III and Queen Charlotte on 22 September 1761 (SUR-BC7D32). Such finds are interesting little bits of social history, so we record them when we can!

19 May 1649 marks the anniversary of England being declared a commonwealth and briefly becoming a republic. What followed was 11 years of general misery, but it left us some interesting coins such as this tiny silver halfpenny (SUR -6CFDAB) from Bletchinglev. which bears the shields of St George and of Ireland on its obverse/reverse respectively.

Over the summer, she will be working with archaeologists, a film-maker, writer,


