Bagshot Park, Ornamental Ponds (SU 902640)

The ponds shown on Rocque's Survey of Berkshire, 1752, at Bagshot Park, differ from the present system of ponds, which dates from about 1800. The main pond was contained by a large, semi-circular dam, embanked against the Windle Brook where it flows in a gully, and covered an area of floodplain about 200 by 100 metres. The dam and a small artificial island are extant in woodland. On the east of the dam, an artificial channel along the side of the valley led to a rectangular cutting into the hillside, with a sluiceway into the stream. Above the cutting is a stepped arrangement of channels, two along the contour, with a cross contour link continuing the line of the cutting. The site of the eastern and upper pond is now pasture, and was not determined, but must have been fed artificially. A similar diversion channel, with a cutting at right-angles was noted at SU 89996448, just inside Berkshire. This led from a point on Windle Brook just below the dam for a much smaller predecessor of Rapley Lake, at SU 89946454. The two present-day ponds at SU 903646 and 902644 appear to have been smaller, with a third pond at SU 902642. There also appears to have been a pond and a system of artificial channels at SU 900643.

Bagshot (SU 912634)

Archaeological sampling has been carried out in advance of site redevelopment to examine potential levels and stratigraphy of P.M., settlement adjacent to the Windle Brook and Bagshot Bridge.

Two areas were examined and both produced evenly distributed material of

P.Med, and Med date but no tangible signs of structures.

The natural gravel is overlain with a 10cm layer of sand from which several Mesolithic flakes have been recovered and site watching, which is continuing, has produced additional flakes and cores, together with P.Med and Med sherds.

An interesting stratified sequence of broken cay pipes has been recorded, numbering approximately 50 bowls, from early 17th century to mid 19th century.

A detailed report will be prepared during 1983 and the material from the excavation deposited at Camberley Museum.

The co-operation of the Surrey Heath Borough Council is gratefully recorded.

Charlwood: Mesolithic Site (TO 232414)

Continuing excavation on this later mesolithic site has so far yielded around 15,000 pieces of flint. Past ploughing and the slope of the land has resulted in a fan-shaped scatter of flint, the bulk of which appears to be derived from an oval area approx. 18m by 12m around the edge of which four hearth groups have been located.

Cooking pits have produced calcined bone, the largest pieces of which appear to be from roe deer. Charcoal from one pit has been submitted to Harwell for re-dating. A late date is suspected as a few of the 150 microliths recovered are partly pressure flaked. Around 80% of the microliths are small scalene triangles while the remainder include convex-backed pieces, lunates and "micro-tranchets". The ubiquitous obliquely-blunted point is represented by only one example. Tools are rare, the commonest pieces being truncated flakes. Notably scarce are scrapers which are represented by only two dubious pieces.

East Molesey/Walton on Thames boundary: City of London Coal Tax Post

With co-operation from the Thames Water Authority, the Esher District Local History Society have been able to locate, conserve and re-erect the City of London Coal Tax Post which had stood on the north bank of the River Ember. Its new

position is by the side of a newly excavated channel.

The site engineer arranged with the contractor to have the post lifted from the water where it had sunk in mud and transport it to the site depot. There the Esher Local History Society scraped, cleaned, primed and painted it ready for re-erection as near as possible to its original position and wish to record their appreciation to the Thames Water Authority and the site engineer for their assistance in restoring this little piece of industrial archaeology to its rightful place.

Frimley (SU 876581)

Foundation excavations for a new building cut through and removed 1m wide by 60cm ditch on approximately north/south alignment. Upper filling of ditch contained P.Med sherds and lower filling contained Med and Surrey White Ware sherds.

THE HOPE-TAYLOR COLLECTION: Chelsham, Henley Wood (TQ 375586)

Further to the material produced by Dr Brian Hope-Taylor (Bull 181) and handed to the East Surrey Museum, examination of items from the Henley Wood site revealed sherds of a hand-made black, rather coarse, pot, burnished inside and outside, which was obviously much earlier than the site of the manor house which stood in the enclosure, c. 1150-1350. These sherds have been examined at the Department of Archaeology, Southampton University, where they are pronounced to be Saxon, dated 6-7th century.

This interesting large site, enclosed by an irregular bank and ditch with a long inturned entrance very similar to that at some Iron Age hillforts (although there is nothing else to suggest an Iron Age date) is a scheduled ancient monument and no

archaeological examination is allowed at present.

Abinger: Abinger Motte (TQ 115459)

The finds from Abinger Motte (Bull 181) have been passed over to Guildford Museum, from whose area they came.

Vicars Haw, Limpsfield (TQ 428516)

The considerable amount of sherds from the Vicars Haw Kiln (Limpsfield Pottery) (Bull 181) are in the custody of John Russell, 41 Chaldon Common Road, Chaldon. They are being analysed by Michael Russell for a forthcoming report.


