### **Industrial Archaeology**

At one of our recent Zoom meetings, we held a Zoom poll in which attendees were asked to choose the industrial history subjects they were most interested in. # Introducing: Spelthorne Museum

Spelthorne Museum in Staines<sup>3</sup> was founded by volunteers in 1980, initially to display the many objects which were being found during archaeological digs from the 1970s onwards, as the town of Staines was being redeveloped. The collections have considerably expanded since, to cover the archaeology and social history of the Borough of Spelthorne. Staines itself was an important Roman town, named Pontes ("Bridges" in Latin) after the bridges which carried the London to Silchester Road over the River Thames here; the museum has a large collection of artefacts from Roman times (and earlier – like these coins).



Other highlights of the collection include the original London Stone, dating from 1285, which marked the upstream limit of the jurisdiction of the City of London over the River Thames, and a 1738 hand pumped fire engine, manufactured by Hadley of Longacre, London, for the Parish of Staines.



<sup>3</sup> Staines was historically part of Middlesex but transferred to Surrey in 1965; it was officially renamed Staines-upon-Thames in 2012. Industrial history enthusiasts will be interested to learn about the Staines Linoleum Co, which was founded in 1864, and was the first place in the world in which the floor covering was manufactured. The museum has a collection of pattern books, photos and documents saved from the old factory when it closed after a century, during which it was the largest employer in the town. (Curator Nick Pollard can offer talks on Staines Linoleum Co - and many other aspects of Spelthorne's varied historv) The museum education team holds regular family activity days, themed on different periods of history, and do outreach work with local schools. A regular talks programme covers subjects of local archaeological and historical interest.

In May 2025, the museum will move to the new Staines Library Hub in the Elmsleigh Shopping Centre. Until then, it is accessed via the current Staines library, and most of it is open during library opening hours. A further room is open when the museum is staffed (Wednesday & Friday 2-4pm, Saturday 1.30-4.30pm).
