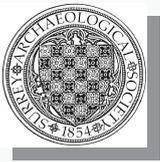
Albury Park community test pitting

A third and final week of test pitting was completed at Albury Park this month, despite the wind and rain, with many thanks due to the hardworking dig and finds team (as well as the core group who helped make the open day such a success).

A total of 18 test pits have been excavated this season, which have provided a good initial overview of the site's development and relationship to historic features within the park-land, including activity along the line of the former road to Shere and Dog Kennel Lane. In addition to medieval pottery, an artefact of note includes a late medieval enamelled heraldic mount, potentially once decoration for a harness or carriage and that of the Beauchamps, the earls of Warwick ([SUR-542253](#) on the PAS database).

A more detailed write-up will be available in a forthcoming *Surrey's Past* alongside a full interim report. We look forward to hopefully returning to the site in the spring!



Treasure – not all that glitters

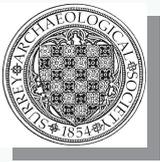
On **Saturday 14 October** at St Augustine's Abbey, Chilworth (10:30-12:15), a public talk will be given by Dr Anna Gannon (author of *The Iconography of Early Anglo-Saxon Coinage*) which examines the UK Treasure Act, how it has evolved and why. Having defined what constitute treasure, the talk will consider some case studies of why changes were necessary and why the process of registering finds is so important.

The venue is the Assisi Room at the rear of the monastery (St Augustine's Abbey, Sample Oak Lane, Chilworth, Guildford, Surrey GU4 8QR); parking free. £5 per person payable on the door – no need to book.





Finds from the FLO

Constans II of the eastern Roman / Byzantine empire was assassinated on this month (15 September) in AD 668. This heavily worn coin of his ([SUR-A720E8](#)) was found while mudlarking on the Thames near Richmond. Of Syracuse mint, the obverse of the heavily corroded copper-alloy coin shows Constans on

the left holding a long cross, with Constantine IV standing on the right with a cross on globe. Heraclius and Tiberius appear on the reverse.

USAAF reconnaissance photographic archive now available

A collection of Second World War aerial photography has been made accessible to the public for the first time. The photographs were taken by the United States Army Air Forces Photographic Reconnaissance units stationed around England in 1943 and 1944. They offer a unique view of England as it changed during the war, capturing airfields with American bombers, ancient monuments which are surrounded by anti-tank defences and bomb-damaged stadiums. The Material Culture of English Rural Households c. 1250–1600 e-book

Drawing on the results of the Leverhulme Trust funded project 'Living Standards and Material Culture in English Rural Households, 1300-1600', this free open access e-book represents the first national-scale interdisciplinary analysis of non-elite consumption in the later Middle Ages. The research is situated around rising living standards following the Black Death, the commercialisation of the English economy and 'revolution' in consumer behaviour.
